Prosser Career Education Center is excited to welcome the addition of the Central Service Technician certification to the Health Careers Program. Central Service Technicians manage the medical devices and supplies needed in patient care, especially during surgery. Each student will participate in a four hundred hour internship at a Norton Healthcare facility. Each student will also earn an Ivy Tech CST certificate of completion and twenty-one college credits.
